David Horvitz


David Horvitz is a California based artist which utilizes the View-Master based on the 19th century stereoscope. Is project on Hermosa Beach, CA the viewer cannot see the sequence numbers printed on the reels and loose track of where they are in the series of images since the only change in the series are the waves in the ocean. The beginning and end of the series is irrelevant since the viewer moves abruptly from frame to frame. He is also explaining how the shooting relates the the viewing of the series in the View-Master, when he is photographing it is spent in silence, just as the clam silent way of looking at the images through the medium.





Noah Scalin

Noah Scalin is known for his 'Dead Media' Project creating a scull made out of VHS tapes. His work is heavily based on the concept of how dark is required to understand light, that destruction is what makes creation valuable. In the dead media project, violence and death are contrasted with objects tat represent intellectual and technological achievements of the human race.
